



Begin Date: Monday, September 28, 2020

- Initial ELPAC must be completed within the first 30 days of instruction
- State approved a 45-day extension to the first 30 days due to COVID-19
- 550 students are waiting to be tested
- Limited staff are available for testing

Special Education Assessments







- 388 pending initial assessments
- 125 triennial assessments overdue and 390 due within the next 75 days
- "File reviews" are triennial reviews where parent and district agree not to assess
 - Staff are encouraged to utilize this process for as many triennials as possible.
- If assessment is required, we currently have two options:
 - Conduct a virtual assessment or;
 - Parent agrees to wait and/or withdraw their consent

CONDUCTING IN-PERSON ASSESSMENTS


- Proposed Staff from Contracted Agencies
 - 41-Speech and Language Pathologists
 - 6-Occupational Therapists
 - 2-School Psychologists



GUIDELINES




- Students and coaches must ensure social distancing of at least six feet
- Students will have access to restrooms and designated areas as long as they are with their assigned cohort
- Athletes are to remain in the same cohort
- No indoor operation of gyms or fitness centers
- Only 12 athletes per workout group can take place (it is preferred that there is one coach per 12 athletes)



GUIDELINES



- Students cannot share equipment or materials (I.e. balls)
- Students cannot have physical contact each other at all during practice
- Students must bring their own water bottles
- Water stations will be available for filling up personal water bottles



LOGISTICS

Step 1: Coaches and trainers will report to the check-in location
Step 2: The trainers will screen the coaches and coaches will report to their assigned area in the check-in location to wait for their athletes

- Step 3: All student athletes check in
 - Station 1: Large posters with a questionnaire about COVID-19 will be posted
 - Station 2: Temperature and symptom checks
 - Station 3: Athletes obtain a bright color wrist-band indicating they have been screened

- Station 4: Athletes report to their coaches to begin conditioning School administrators and athletic directors will enforce all COVID-19 procedures and protocols.


VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS



- At this phase, we do not have permission from state or county to bring marching bands back to campus.
- Although we have guidance for small cohorts, that does not grant permission from the county for visual and performing arts groups to practice or perform.
- The county has made it clear that guidance for one group or situation should not be applied outside of the group.
- This may change as we enter the next tier.

Guidance

• CDE Guidance updated its original guidance. The new guidance defines:

- Cohort: a cohort is a stable group of no more than 14 children or youth and no more than two supervising adults (or a configuration of no more than 16 individuals total in the cohort) in a supervised environment in which supervising adults and children stay together for all activities (e.g., meals, recreation, etc.), and avoid contact with people outside of their group in the setting.
- This information relates to all student groups, including English Language Learners and Special Education.

Special Education Cohorts




- CDE published cohort guidance that clarifies:
 - Students with disabilities should be prioritized

- Specialized services may include occupational therapy services, speech and language services, behavioral services, and other educational support
- Specialized services must be provided one-on-one for students who are in separate cohorts
- Staff who are providing specialized services should be assigned to work with students in as few cohorts as possible
- Cohorts may include more than two adults (i.e. One-to-One Instructional Aides) provided the total size of the cohort does not exceed 16 individuals*

California Department of Education permits expanded learning program services on campus and in-person

• Details for cohorting and services

- Grades TK-6
- 14 Students per 1 Staff Member
- All-day elementary program will serve 42-84 per school
- Breakfast and lunch will be provided
- In addition to classrooms, three rooms are needed one for office and two in the event students need to be isolated.












Variety of posters ordered district-wide for each site

Why Process Is Important


- Building relationships and trust matters and goes both ways
